Sales Update

Property Management



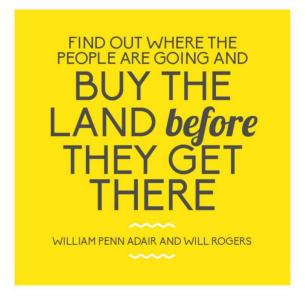
The vacancy rate for rentals continues to remain on the higher side although steady, with quite a bit of choice for tenants. While there are certainly advantages being a tenant in a tough sales market like this, including choice of rentals and quite often cheaper rent, don't forget the down side. In a good steady market where rent returns are reasonable and vacancy rates are low, investors tend to keep properties for the longer term so no one has to move.

Being a tenant can be frustrating as you are governed largely by what your owner chooses to do, who in turn is governed largely by the economic circumstances at the time. The price of property in our area hasn't been fantastic over recent years and it would seem hard to make a case for being a landlord. The positive though is in the long term growth in the value of the property, which historically does happen! The time to buy an investment property is surely when they are cheapest?
